

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THE FEDERATION OF INDIAN COMMUNITIES OF QUEENSLAND INC. (FICQ)

The Federation of Indian Communities of Queensland Inc. (FICQ) was formed as a secular, not-for-profit peak body to play a leadership role in 1998 by passionate Queenslanders of Indian origin to bring all the various regional, cultural and linguist Indian groups in Queensland together under the one umbrella organisation.

Recognition as a peak body

FICQ is recognised by all levels of Government, the non-government sector and the private sector as the peak body in Queensland for all associations, organisations and societies representing people of Indian origin from countries around the world, including India, Fiji, South Africa and Malaysia.

Who can become a member?

Membership of FICQ is open to all incorporated, constitutionally structured organisations representing communities who are of Indian origin or identify with India in Queensland. The President of each member organisation or their nominee represents their organisation on FICQ. Individuals are not eligible for membership in FICQ.

How does FICQ work?

All Indian member organisations that are eligible are elected to the executive body to run FICQ. Member organisations can influence the directions of FICQ by joining the Executive Committee (EC) and participating n Governing Council (GC) meetings. EC members have the scope to influence the broader national agenda through amending interim meetings of the Confederation of Indian Associations in Australia being held in major cities in Australia.

▶ Benefits of joining

FICQ creates a platform for all Indian organisations FICQ provides important networking opportunities with senior Ministers, elected representatives from local, state and federal governments, senior executives of key government departments, members of other community organisations and leaders from the private and non-government sectors. More recently FICQ has introduced the Chai series to facilitate a networking opportunity for member organisations.

FICQ also provides a platform to contribute to Government policy debates by supporting eligible individuals from member organisations to nominate for the Multicultural Queensland Advisory Council and participate in other significant discussions with all levels of government and non-government organisations.

FICQ works closely with the Indian Government and its representative for the High Commission of India in Australia (HCI) in Canberra and has regular meetings with vising Indian dignitaries and Government officials to discuss ways to strengthen es between Indian residents in Australia and their country of origin.

Through FICQ members can also participate in important one-off events such as G20, meetings with the HCI in Australia and other officials to voice matters of concern for the Indian communities.

FICQ plays a key role in encouraging all members and key individual and Indian organisations representatives to participate in the annual Premier's reception in Queensland Parliament.







Showcasing cultural heritage and talent to the broader community

Member organisations can showcase their cultural heritage and talents of members to the broader Australian community through participation in annual FICQ-organised events such as:

- Annual Diwali Celebrations in King George Square, Brisbane CBD, one of the signature calendar festivals in Queensland.
- Annual Joint Australia India Day celebrations in various locations to commemorate Indian Republic Day and Australia Day.

FICQ also supports showcasing community heritage through EC members attending events organised by member organisations and other community organisations.

Cost reduction

Members can receive significant cost savings through FICQ's group public liability insurance cover scheme. FICQ can negotiate with wholesale suppliers and event management companies to supply goods and services for discounted rates for member organisations. Members can also access FICQ's Public Address (PA) system for their events and celebrations through a simple registration process and a nominal security deposit.

FICQ Inc Toastmasters Club Initiative

FICQ Inc has partnered with the renowned Toastmasters International to create a Toastmasters Club inside FICQ Inc exclusively for our Member Associations. The ability to Communicate effectively has always been an important skill set, especially important for migrant communities, like ours, where English is not our first language. FICQ Inc. through this Toastmasters Initiative is looking to provide an opportunity for Member Associations to gain this important skill set. Access to this Toastmasters Club will be heavily subsidised by FICQ Inc to provide this as a benefit for our Member Associations. FICQ Inc vision is to have multiple Toastmasters Clubs inside FICQ inc – exclusively for women, Students etc and also to assist Member Associations with the formation of such initiatives within their own Associations.

Event Promotion

Member organisations can publicise their events in FICQ's web portal. FICQ also promotes member associations' events with other organisations through using FICQ web, emails and social media pages.

Support for applications and important initiatives

If requested, FICQ can provide supporting or reference leers for member organisations' grant applications or important initiatives and events.

Australians of Indian Heritage War Memorial QLD Inc.



India played a significant role in both war and peace towards democracy at home and worldwide.

About 4 million Indians fought and about 90,000 lost their lives in the World Wars.

World War I (1914-1918):

In WW1 about 1.3 million Indian soldiers fought and 74,000 lost their lives in the WWI. At Gallipoli 15,000 Indians fought and 1,500 lost their lives (11915 –1916).

The war effort drained India's resources, leading to widespread poverty, famine, and political unrest.

World War II (1939-1945):

About 2.5 million Indians fought and 87,000 lost their lives.

India served as a major supply base and staging area for Allied operations in the region.

The war weakened British colonial rule, paving the way for India's independence movement.

Field-Marshal Sir Claude Auchinleck, Commander-in-Chief of the Indian Army from 1942 asserted that the British "couldn't have come through both wars if they hadn't had the Indian Army."

With a view to remember the sacrifices of Indians, the Australians of Indian Heritage War Memorial QLD Inc (Indian War Memorial) was formed as an incorporated body with the following objectives:

- (1) To act as a body of people to commemorate the fallen defense people of Indian Heritage in all Wars that Australia and other allied nations participated
- (2) To develop and maintain War Memorials for the defense people of Indian Heritage, and to pay respects at the Memorials on important national days of Australia and India
- (3) To educate greater Australians of the role Indian diaspora played in all the Wars
- (4) To foster mateship with members of the War Memorials for Indian diaspora in other states of Australia and overseas.

The committee urges all Australian Indians to join us to construct a Memorial for Indians who sacrificed their lives to get the freedom we enjoy in India and democracies enjoyed worldwide.

Basava Samithi has been in the forefront in propagating Basava philosophy of life and the teachings of Basavanna and other contemporary Sharanas of 12th Century across the world. Basava Samithi of Australasia Brisbane Branch Inc. came to existence on 18th June 2005. It was inaugurated by Dr P.S.Shankar, Director, Gulburga Medical College, Karnataka, India. Basava Samithi was set up with a view of propagating the Basava philosophy which is all about wishing well of all living beings irrespective of their caste, gender, colour or creed.

Basavanna, the founder of Lingayath faith, was the first person in the world to invent and practise democracy in the 12th century A.D. Basavanna spread social awareness through his poetry, popularly known as Vachanaas. He rejected gender or social discrimination, superstitions and rituals but introduced Ishtalinga necklace, with an image of the God (Ishta Linga) to every person regardless of his or her caste, creed and gender, to be a constant reminder of one's bhakti (devotion) to Lord Ishtalinga. A strong promoter of ahimsa or non-violence, he also condemned human and animal sacrifices. As the Chief Minister of King Bijjala's empire, Basavanna introduced the world's first parliament known as the 'Anubhava Mantapa' ("The Hall of Spiritual Experience"), which welcomed men and women from all socio-economic backgrounds to discuss spiritual and mundane questions of life, in the open. His 'Anubhava Mantapa ' was the driving force and inspiration for our beloved Prime Minister Shree Narendra Modi in building India's new Parliament House 'Central Vista' and 'Bharath Mandapam', the venue of the recently concluded G20 Summit in New Delhi.

Basava Samithi centres are established all over the world in order to bring about communal harmony, inculcate social values among individuals which lay the foundation for a strong social, economic, moral society. We organise events like, Basava Jayanthi, Vachana Shravana, Basava Mahamane and actively participate in events like Clean-Up Australia day, Indian Day Parade and blood donations.



Club de Goa



Club de Goa is a non-profit organisation formed with the aim of preserving and promoting the culture and traditions of Goa—a State in southern India. It encourages social, educational, cultural and sporting activities to keep alive the old traditions, and build ties with Australia in a friendly spirit of understanding and co-operation. Membership is open to anyone, regardless of religion, who subscribes to these objectives.

Goa was a former Portuguese enclave (for over 450 years), and is one of India's foremost tourist destinations. It combines Portuguese architecture and flavour to a lifestyle, which manages to co-exist with the Indian lifestyle even after being incorporated into India over 60 years ago. Goa is a tiny wonderland; a unique tropical paradise half way down India's West Coast (approximately 600 km. south of Mumbai), on the shores of the Arabian Sea. The State has been lavished endless praise for her natural loveliness and serenity. Palm fringed beaches, miles and miles of golden sand dotted with tourist cottages and international resorts, vast rice paddy fields, slumbering villages, churches, temples, shrines, forts, ruins and ancient caves all contribute to the charm. Goa is often referred to as the 'Rome of the East', and in fact the abandoned area known as Old Goa was once a thriving city. This place still boasts a complex of ancient churches, convents, temples and monasteries unique in the Eastern world. Herein lies the famous Basilica Bom Jesus, where the miraculously preserved remains of St. Francis Xavier, the patron saint of Goa, is enshrined in a silver casket. The major industries in the state are the mining industry, followed by tourism and hospitality industry.

CDG is active in many areas. It participated in the opening of the Southbank Parklands in 1992 by presenting the Kunbi dance and the Mando; at the UTSAV festival organised at the Chandlers auditorium; presented the Dekhni, a traditional cultural dance. Besides these public presentations, members often dance the Mando and Currodinho at the feast of its patron saint - St Francis Xavier.

The Club organised the GOALYMPICS, an interstate games tournament with its NSW counterpart in Brisbane in April 2001, and Sydney the following year. The Club also participates with other communities in sporting events. It hosts long weekend camps, usually in remote areas, which many members look forward to, to get away from the city buzz.















